The 93<sup>rd</sup> Annual Missouri Lions State Convention was held in Cape Girardeau, Missouri. If you were not part of this year's event; I have to say you missed a great convention. This year the Convention was hosted by Lions from District 26-M1 and they did a fantastic job. Next year District 26-M6 is the host for the 94<sup>th</sup> Annual Missouri Lions State Convention which will be held in Springfield, Missouri in 2016.

The 93<sup>rd</sup> Annual Missouri Lions State Convention started with the Council of Governor's meeting on Thursday afternoon from 4 to 6 PM with committee reports from various State chairs providing details about their activities for the past three months.

Past International Director Donald Knipp introduced the conventions special guest speaker; International 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice President, Robert Corlew and his partner in service Lion Diane Corlew.

Following his introduction; meeting attendees heard reports from the state chairpersons for **Leader Dog** and **Lions Business Opportunities for the Blind (LBOMB).** Both of these are Missouri Lions approved projects. The convention was adjourned; Lions were reminded to return at 6 PM for the hospitality event.

Convention activities started again promptly at 9 AM Saturday morning and continued throughout the day. During our Lunch the Missouri State Peace Poster Winner was introduced and awarded a check for her participation in the 2014-2015 Lions Club International Peace Poster Contest.

The highlight of Saturday afternoon was the **Kentucky Derby Party**; ladies attending this event proudly displayed their fancy hats. Some gentleman came with their own version of a Derby Hat, no winner was chosen for that category. This event raised \$1,000 for Lions Club International Foundation in less than 2 hours. Lions selected a horse and bought tickets which they deposited into numbered buckets corresponding to the horse's race number. Sunday morning was highlighted with a special Memorial Service for Lions who have passed away during the past lionistic year. **Melaina's Magical Playground** was inspired by the daughter of a local couple. She was a spunky, 3-year old who did not let a disease like *Memaline Myopathy* diminish her spirit. Even though she had physical limitations, she still wanted the adventure that comes to a child through a playground. In her memory and honor, her parents and other local community leaders organized a committee with the goal of building a playground with no limitations for any individual. When the idea of the all-inclusive playground was first pitched to the community, the estimated cost was \$500,000. By 2010 the estimate had risen to \$750,000.





# Glaucoma Screening Equipment Available to Lions, starting July 1, 2015

Does your club have an upcoming event or want to host a glaucoma screening in your community? Saving Sight is going to make its tonometers available to Lions Clubs to conduct their own glaucoma screenings. Tonometers blow a puff of air at the screened person's eye to read eye pressure, which can indicate a risk for glaucoma. Beginning on July 1, your club can borrow one of Saving Sight's tonometers for use at a local screening.

The machines are very easy to use, and Saving Sight will provide instructions. To reserve one, please contact Leigha Bartlett at 573-777-8507 or ibartlett@saving-sight.org at least 2 weeks before your event to make arrangements. Know that these devices are heavy. Tonometers come in a padded rolling case, but it is recommended that users be able to lift 50 lbs. Future screenings and tonometer reservations will be viewable on the Saving Sight web calendar.



## Cornea Recipient Can Watch the Shows and Work Again

For Jamie from Branson, MO, cornea transplantation has been a truly life-enhancing experience. Jamie works for Tantone Industries, a nonprofit sheltered workshop that provides meaningful work opportunities to people like Jamie who have developmental disabilities. Additionally, as a resident of Branson, he loves to watch the country and gospel music shows for which the city is so famous. Jamie suffers from keratoconus, though, which could have caused him to go blind in both eyes, losing his ability to work and enjoy the music shows. But thanks to comea transplantation, he has regained his sight.

"He's never been able to see very well," said Dorothy, Jamie's grandmother, with whom he's lived for the past 10 years, "About six to seven years ago, Jamie started complaining about his eyesight." According to the National Keratoconus Foundation, keratoconus "is a non-inflammatory eye condition in which the normally round dome-shaped cornea progressively thins, causing a cone-like bulge to develop." As his eye lost its round shape, Jamie couldn't get a pair of contacts to fit well on his eye. "Jamie's mother is a dispensing optician," said Dorothy, "She tried several different lenses, but he was really not able to use any of them very long." Eventually, Dorothy took Jamie to an ophthalmologist who recommended a specialty pair, but they were difficult to put in place as well as rather expensive. "It got to the point where he'd only put them in when we went to a show or somewhere he needed to see better," said Dorothy.

Ultimately, Jamle had to get cornea transplants, the first in May 2013. Transplant surgery for keratoconus takes longer to heal than some other cornea surgeries, so the second transplant took place 18 months later after the first was healed. He is still healing, but his vision is already greatly improved. "I can see everything clearer," said Jamle. "I'm happy with the transplants. I'm happy I have good eyes to see. It's really good not wearing the contacts." He notices the improvement most at the Branson music shows. "Normally we ask for a seat in the third or fourth row, but after the first surgery, we sat in the twenty-third row and he could see," said Dorothy.



Thanks to his donors, his surgeon, and Saving Sight, Jamie regained the vision he lost to keratoconus.

Once his eyes heal, Jamie hopes to return to work at Tantone Industries. Tantone offers a variety of employment options to more than 40 disabled adults, and Jamie's favorite occupation is the laundry department. "They have a commercial laundry with two huge washers and two huge dryers," said Dorothy. "In summertime he's especially busy."

Before he returns to work, Jamie and Dorothy want to thank the families of the heroic people who donated corneas so he could see again. "Jamie is very grateful to his donors," said Dorothy. "He grasps where his 'new eyes' came from." The transplant experience has been such a success that Jamie and Dorothy also have become big supporters of donation. "We just appreciate so much that he had these donors, and Jamie would like to express his appreciation to their families," said Dorothy. "He wouldn't have his eyesight back if it weren't for the donors."
